Walmart Foundation awards \$50,000 to Lake County Council on Aging

MENTOR – The Walmart Foundation awarded the Lake County Council on Aging a \$50,000 grant to support the organization's Meals-On-Wheels program that provides nutritious meals to homebound seniors throughout Lake County.

"With these funds, the Council on Aging will be able to continue providing nutritious meals to an ever-growing number of needy, homebound senior citizens," said Joe Tomsick, chief executive officer for the council. "Over the last year we have seen a 20 percent increase in the number of seniors requesting home delivered meals, and yet funding for the program has continued to decrease to the tune of almost a 40 percent reduction since 2011, due in part to major federal cuts."

Last year, with the help of close to 600 community volunteers, the Lake County Council on Aging was able to prepare and deliver 153,564 nutritious meals to more than 1,200 individual clients.

"The cornerstone to Walmart and the Walmart Foundation's \$2 billion commitment to fight hunger is

supporting local organizations that are making sure people have access to healthy food," said Walmart Market Human Resources Coordinator Marlene Perez. "We know one in six individuals in Northeastern Ohio live with food insecurity so we are proud to support the Lake County Council on Aging, along with the staff and volunteers who help so many seniors in the area to live better."
